

Australian eucalyptus growers could be heading for a windfall

Conference updates north Asian pulpmill woodchip demand

CHANGING dynamics are working strongly in favour of Australian eucalyptus forest owners and woodchip suppliers.

The eucalyptus plantation sector has experienced some serious volatility in demand and pricing over the last decade – indeed since the first MIS scheme company failed in 2009.

The next five years was a very disruptive period for plantation owners as several went into receivership, with buyers able to fill most of their order books under a 'distressed vessel category' and at discounted price.

Recently, however, the sector has re-consolidated into a smaller number of very large and well capitalised companies, which have been

able to increase (mostly) woodchips to north Asia; some have also increased volumes of eucalyptus veneer logs being shipped to China (and from 2018 to Malaysia).

Woodchip exports have

increased from 5 million bone dry metric tonnes (BDMT) in 2015, to 6.6 million BDMT in 2017 (+26%). This was a far cry from only 3.2 million BDMT in 2012. In fact, the export volume has doubled in the last five years. [A BDMT

is about 0.53 green tonnes].

Sessions at a DANA conference and field trip in Launceston in October will closely focus on how these dynamics strongly

favour Australian eucalypt forest owners and woodchip suppliers.

Although a number of owners have been, and are converting plantations to other land uses, the actual area reduction intensity is speculative. But earlier this year Indufor Australia produced a future eucalyptus harvest volume prediction chart for American forest industry publisher RISI, to use in its major annual publication The International Pulpwood Trade Review.

This chart, covering the recent actual and future Indufor predictions of annual harvest, shows a short-term increase from 10.1 million tonnes in 2016-17 to 10.8 million tonnes at a peak in 2019-2020 before a sharp and accelerating drop off occurs and continues to mid-next decade at least.

But that is only part of the story.



The dynamics of the whole southeast and north Asian chip supply and demand scene is complex. However, increasingly it looks like other suppliers will not only not be able to match reduced Australian supplies, and some large suppliers will likely have serious problems of their own.

In 2018, RISI predicted a potential "base case" deficit of 2 million BDMT by 2022, 38% of the RISI predicted total Australian chip exports in 2022, although this could be as high as 4 billion BDMT – a whopping

75% of RISI-predicted 2022 Australian chip exports.

Actual 'deficits' are unlikely to occur. Instead, prices rise, attracting new more mote and high-cost volumes into the market. This would benefit Australian suppliers

New information out since the RISI prediction was made in March 2018 suggests that this deficit is likely to be higher than the base case estimate. Not only are the new Chinese pulpmills coming on stream now – known to be far larger than RISI understood them to be in March - but it is more likely that a huge new Chilean pulpmill will be built in the next five years, and hence severely reducing the annual 3 million BDMT Chilean export supplies to north Asia.

So what does this mean for Australian eucalyptus plantation owners, both on the mainland (E. globulus) and in Tasmania (E. nitens)?

The fibre supply balance continues to change dynamically – almost monthly. For this reason DANA has scheduled two international and one Australian speaker to address the various components of this balance at its 2018 Australian Forestry and Forest Products Sector Conference and Field Trip from October 9 to 12 in Launceston.

THE online edition of Timber&Forestry enews this month posted its best weekly readership gains, which nailed the masthead as Australia's most influential trade media brand in the sector.



\$4 million research funding investment to boost sustainability, jobs and economic benefits in partnership with industry

With the support of the Australian and South Australian governments, the Mt Gambier hub of the National Institute for Forest Products Innovation has up to \$4 million available for research grants to grow the future of forestry. Research projects could include: developing new products in relation to composites, extractives and bioenergy; improving workplace innovation, safety and efficiency; enhancing tree growing including forest health and genetic gain; maximising precision management and applying new technologies; improving the forestry social licence; and identifying opportunities with robotics, automation and artificial intelligence. Individual research grants will range from \$50,000-\$500,000 and will be for periods of up to three years in duration. Funding proposals close on Friday 7 September 2018 and should be lodged via email to funding.sa@nifpi.org.au. Forest industries add over 7.3bn to Victorian economy: key report

Softwood plantations generate highest employment at 47.7pc

THE forest industry contributed more than \$7 billion to the Victorian economy last financial year.

This includes \$1.9 billion in direct sales, and a further \$5.4 billion once flow-on effects in other industries are included, leading to a total contribution to gross regional product (the regional equivalent of GDP) of \$779 million.

These figures are among

the key findings of two reports funded by Forest and Wood Products Australia - the new socio-economic impacts of the forest industry in Victoria and an earlier



Jacki Schirmer... optimism about future demand.

report examining the Green Triangle region.

The research was conducted by the University of Canberra in conjunction

with consultancy EconSearch, a division of BDO Advisory.

In terms of jobs, the Victorian forestry industry (excluding the Green Triangle region) overall generated 14,475 direct jobs, including almost 5115 in primary processing, and more than 9360 in secondary processing.

The new report reveals:

 Softwood plantations generate the highest employment at 47.7% followed by native forests at 32% and hardwood plantations at 8.9%, with the

remaining 11.4% dependent on native forests and plantations grown in other regions.

- The industry is an important contributor to the economy in several regional communities, and contributes to diversification of the economy in many regions. In Melbourne there were 7,717 jobs generated (mostly in secondary processing), 3646 in the Central Highlands and Gippsland, 1677 in the western region, 1435 in the north central region.
- Of the jobs in primary processing, 55.3% are located in the Central Highlands and Gippsland, 19.6% were in the North Central region, 12.7% in the western region and 12.4% in Melbourne.
- The Local Government Areas with the highest dependence on the forest industry for direct employment were Alpine (6.8%), Latrobe (4.7%), Benalla (4.7%), Colac-Otway (4.5%), Wellington (3.2%), East Gippsland (2.1%), and Murrundindi (2.0%).
- Between 2011 and 2016, there was growth of 22% in employment in the primary production part of the industry, driven in

part by growth in harvest of hardwood plantations. However, during the same time, employment in wood and paper product manufacturing declined by almost 30% (29%).

Managing director of Forest and Wood Products Australia Ric Sinclair said the employment trend in wood and paper product manufacturing was attributable to increases in labour productivity and reduced availability of hardwood sawlogs.

Victorian forest industry workers are slightly less likely than those in other industries to earn lower incomes (less than \$649 a week), largely due to the higher rates of fulltime work, but also less likely to earn high incomes (above \$1250 a week).

Recruitment was a

challenge for industry, in particular difficulty recruiting managers and high level professional staff (reported by 70% of businesses surveyed); transport workers (69%), heavy machine operators (67%) and field staff (63%). Some 16% of forestry workers were women, compared to 48% of the broader labour force.

MOST JOBS GENERATED BY **PROCESSING SECTOR**

Lead researcher Associate Professor Jacki Schirmer said that businesses were relatively optimistic about future demand for forest products.

"About half surveyed (51%) felt demand would remain

the same, about one-third (31%) felt that the demand would grow and a few (18%) that demand would reduce.

"There are still big challenges facing many businesses, including recruitment difficulties, increasing cost of labour, government regulations and rising input costs," she said.

"In Victoria, as with other states, the majority of forestry jobs are generated by the processing sector, as is the majority of the industry's flow-on economic impact. This highlights the importance of local processing of wood and fibre for the generation of jobs."

Note: Benefits from the Green Triangle that could not be attributed to either Victoria or South Australia in isolation have not been included.

A dark stain of domestic violence

Rotten to the core in society... and it takes many forms

LET'S be blunt here – domestic violence continues to spread a very dark stain across our communities.

In a country that prides itself on Jack-is-as-good-as-his-master and a fair go for all, domestic violence is a rotten core in our society.

Frankly, getting married to a partner who ends up bashing the crap out of you never made any sense to me. I guess I am physically robust enough to handle myself. Plus, and to be accurate, in my male-dominated workplace, cold and bleak as it is this time of the year, you earn respect, irrespective of gender, by your ability and performance.

Also, I often carry around a pinch bar, handy for tasks like prizing branches out of tyre chains or pieces of wood out of felling heads. Plus I have whacked an itinerant snake with it on a couple of occasions. So any brute who touches me uninvited might get a broken bloody arm.

But all women are not so fortunate. I have seen some of them in town – poor buggers, beaten, crying, a couple of kids in tow and nowhere to go to escape a drunken lump of a partner.

Domestic violence is clearly widespread and takes many forms. It occurs when someone who has a close personal relationship with you makes you feel afraid, powerless or unsafe. It can be physical, but can also be emotional and psychological. And it happens across communities, ages, cultures and genders.

Domestic violence is a crime and the abuser is breaking the law.

Most domestic violence occurs in the privacy of people's homes and is committed by men against women. It is rightly recognised to be a serious and widespread problem in Australia with enormous individual and community impacts and social costs.

Domestic violence statistics are really shocking; on average, at least one woman



a week is killed by a partner or former partner; one in three Australian women has experienced physical violence since the age of 15, and one in five Australian women has experienced sexual violence. I won't go on, I am sure you get the picture.

Domestic violence against women is the single largest driver of homelessness for women in the so called 'lucky country', but not if you are on the receiving end of this epidemic that now results in a police call-out on average once every two minutes. The combined health,



New DNA technology translates to 'real dollars' for plantation owners

AN industry 'game changer' is how the Southern Tree Breeding Association has described the use of DNA technology in identifying the physical attributes of trees at the seedling stage.

This technology has significant potential in assisting seedling selection for planting, speeding up growth and boosting log yield.

The 'break through' results of the world-first FWPA-funded research project focused on genetics technology to improve ROI for foresters, which Southern Tree Breeding Association general manager Dr Tony McRae recently presented to Australian scientists and forestry industry

representatives at an event in Mount Gambier.

The significant advances in softwood and hardwood tree breeding research are thought to have the potential to help revolutionise the country's forestry industry, translating into real dollars for plantation owners.

"We are now growing trees faster, with smaller branches,

straighter and with better wood properties," Dr McRae said.

He described how the researchers have been able to "combine the DNA information on individual trees and families with physical characteristics data on a commercial scale breeding program".

"We can now make more

gains by using those pieces of information – a 'first' for trees internationally," Dr McRae said. "They have been doing it in the lab in universities, but they have not done it on a commercial operations scale," Dr McRae said.

Initially developed for use with hardwood, the hope among scientists is the technology will be equally as successful when used with radiata pine.

Dr McRae also used the opportunity to discuss other new technologies with industry members, including resistograph, a high-tech drill with the ability to test timber stiffness in standing trees.




