Increasing the supply of housing requires federal government action

The HIA Affordability Index has fallen across Australia, prompting calls for urgent action.

HIA's Affordability Index is calculated for each of the eight capital cities and regional areas on a quarterly basis and considers the latest dwelling prices, mortgage interest rates, and wage developments.

"The HIA Affordability Index fell by 1.1% in the March Quarter 2023 compared to the preceding quarter, making housing in Australia 25% less affordable than it was before the pandemic," said HIA's deputy managing director for policy and industry, Jocelyn Martin.

Martin noted it now requires 1.6 average incomes to service the typical new mortgage, compared to 1.2 incomes in 2019.

"Housing affordability poses a major challenge across the country, and the issue is paramount on the policy agenda of all levels of government," said Martin. "It

is crucial to identify policies that would work and those that would not, and it begins with a supply-and-demand balance. Rising interest rates are only a part of the story. Housing affordability simply gets worse when housing supply falls short of demand.

"This makes measures that do not increase the number of homes, such as convoluted planning processes and the heavy burden of taxation, likely to fail." Martin expressed frustration at the HAFF being held up in parliament, saying: "This is delaying changes to policy that will begin to address the failures that are constraining an improvement in the supply of new homes.

"In addition to the passage of this legislation through Parliament, there is also a need to reform state government taxes that have forced foreign investors out of the market. The impact

of these taxes has seen foreign investors withdraw from the Australian market and consequently the number of apartments commencing construction fell to barely more than a third of its peak in 2016. Foreign investors do not force up house prices because they cannot buy existing homes. They can only buy new homes and improve the supply of rental accommodation and ease this shortage."

The HIA Affordability Index across all capital cities saw the largest fall in Perth, declining by 2.2 per cent in the March Quarter 2023. This was followed by Sydney (-1.9 per cent), Melbourne (-1.3 per cent), Adelaide (-1.3 per cent), Darwin (-1.1 per cent), and Canberra (-0.8 per cent). Brisbane registered almost no change, while Hobart was the only capital city that registered an improvement in affordability (+1.3 per cent).

\$100 million for new forest products innovation hub

The announcement of the National Institute for Forest Products Innovation at the University of Tasmania has been met with approval by the industry.

AN agreement has been struck between the Commonwealth and University of Tasmania (UTas) on the \$100 million National Institute for Forest Products Innovation (NIFPI). The news was eagerly welcomed by industry groups, including the Australian Forest Products Association (AFPA).

The Federal
Government has
announced in addition
to the new agreement with
UTas – the new institute
will be known under the
new operational name –
Australian Forest and Wood
Innovations (AFWI).

Acting CEO of AFPA, Natasa Sikman said, "AFPA and the broader forest products sector welcomes this progress on the new AFWI as a step towards more exciting research and development for our sector at a time when demand for different types of forest-based products is growing massively, especially to help the environment and to mitigate against climate change.

"The NIFPI was a policy advocated for by AFPA ahead of the 2022 Federal Election and one that like the new program announced around plantation expansion this week, was also a bipartisan one. We are proud to see this progress."

will undertake an annual call for research projects into efforts to: increase domestic timber and wood fibre supply, maximise use and value from our exiting resource and learn more about enhancing sustainable forest management as a means to increase understanding and action on how the forest products sector can play a stronger role in being part of the solution to climate change.

The AFWI will have a central entity based at UTas which will be the administrative centre, that will coordinate research undertaken by three regional research centres and other projects from a national call each year.

One of the regional research centres will be hosted by UTas in Launceston.

The location of the other two regional research centres will be determined via an expression of interest process conducted shortly by the department. The chosen research centres will be contracted through UTas.

New VicForests Timber Release Plan as legal challenge fails

VicForests is committed to supporting regional forestry jobs for as long as possible.

VICFORESTS
has released an
amended Timber
Release Plan
(TRP) to support
the new transition
timeframe out of
native harvesting
after six years
were removed
from the original
timeframe in the
May state budget.

The TRP covers areas where

VicForests may conduct operations in state forests, including timber harvesting. The approved TRP changes include 184 new coupes, 12 coupe boundary changes and



Forest regeneration in progress in an area previously logged by VicForests.

2 coupe driveway additions for previously approved coupes.

In light of Court orders, new reserves and species detections, there are currently significant constraints that limit the ability to plan a coupe to harvest stage. As a result, VicForests has stated it requires flexibility in the coupes available for harvest to provide supply and employment for industry during the Government's managed transition to 1 January 2024.

There had been hopes that some of the Victorian logging bans that have severely limited forestry practices would be lifted during this period, however, those logging bans will likely remain in place until the native timber industry is phased out after an appeal was thrown out.

VicForests had appealed a Supreme Court decision to halt logging in parts of the state after finding the forestry company failed to

adequately survey for protected glider species.

Court of Appeal president Justice Karin Emerton dismissed the appeal alongside Justices Cameron Macaulay and Stephen Kaye, and ordered VicForests to pay court costs.

VicForests
said it was
disappointed with the appeal
outcome and would review
the decision in full before
making any further comment.

Regardless of the legal decision, VicForests remains committed to maintaining forestry jobs for as long as is feasible. All timber harvesting and regeneration operations are subject to Victoria's strict environmental regulations, including the State's Forest Management Zoning scheme.

VicForests' operations are regulated and monitored by Victoria's Office of the Conservation Regulator. VicForests is committed to complying with or exceeding regulatory controls to ensure the sustainable management of forest areas.

A new biocontrol measure to fight a destructive wasp that attacks pine trees

Sirex wasps have devastated pine plantations but now a new nematode might help us win the fight against these flying pests.

THE Sirex wood wasp drills through the bark of pine trees to deliver a double whammy — injecting its venom as well as a fatal wood-rotting fungus that predigests the wood for its larvae. The invasive insect almost destroyed Tasmania's radiata pine industry when

it arrived in Australia in the 1950s, and killed millions of trees in the late 1980s on the South Australia-Victoria border.

Biological controls have been crucial to limiting its damage to Australia's plantation softwood industry,

valued at \$1.22 billion in 2020–21. Former CSIRO scientist Robin Bedding pioneered mass-rearing a nematode to control the wasp after discovering a roundworm with a double life cycle, capable of both sterilising Sirex females and feeding on the fungus spread by the wasp.

It has kept the wasp and its damage in check, but there have been challenges in breeding it.

Now, a Queensland scientist has helped identify a new weapon in the war against the invasive wasp. Researchers discovered a nematode called *Deladenus siricidicola* (Lineage D) in forests in New South Wales, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria and on New Zealand's North Island.

Helen Nahrung from UniSC's Forest Research Institute

shares credit for the discovery with the NSW Department of Primary Industries, the University of Pretoria and Scion, the New Zealand Forest Research Institute.

"It has two very distinct forms one which feeds on the Sirex fungus, and then when it's in proximity to

Sirex larvae, it converts into a parasitic form and burrows into the larvae, reproduces and invades the reproductive organs of the developing females," Dr Nahrung said.

"And then when the wasp emerges, instead of laying eggs into the next tree, it lays this packet of nematodes and then they go on to sterilise the next generation of females."

Dr Nahrung said the new roundworm posed no threat to the environment because it only attacked wood wasps.

"It's a very safe system; I know with biocontrol, people freak out because of all the mistakes made from the past with the cane toad, but no, this is very safe."

Dr Nahrung said researchers had been collecting samples of the new nematode from pine plantations for mass-rearing it for release against the Sirex wasp



Feed tree donation to help koalas

NSW's Forestry Corporation has donated 25,000 koala food trees to help provide habitat and food for koala conservation efforts on the North Coast.

BANGALOW Koalas have set the goal of planting 90,000 trees to establish a new wildlife habitat on private land over the next 12 months. The supply of 25,000 seedlings from the Forestry Corporation's Grafton nursery will assist greatly.

The seedlings were delivered to the Friends of the Koala's Lismore nursery and consist of seven of the preferred koala feed tree species including tallowwood, forest red gum, grey gum, Dunn's white gum, blue gum, blackbutt and flooded gum.



It's been heartening to see many of the plantings undertaken before last year's flooding have bounced back with minimal damage."

Forestry Australia runs information sessions on new plantation establishment program

ON Wednesday 21 June the Australian Government announced the \$73.8 million Support Plantation Establishment program to support the establishment of new plantations. The program is designed to help secure Australia's future domestic wood supply and help meet Australia's carbon emission reduction commitments. Grants will be open to private industry, First Nations businesses, farm foresters, and state and territory government forestry enterprises.

The Australian Government will provide \$2000 (GST exclusive) per 1 hectare of new plantation forest established. Applicants are required to provide a co-contribution

equal to the grant amount.

Grant funding can be used for: preparation of the plantation forest site; the purchase and planting of seedlings; or the payment of labour and contract planting fees.

NSW Audit Office finds issues with Forestry Corporation monitoring

The corporation has admitted some processes have not been optimal and has committed to improvement, at the same time as welcoming positive findings.

THE Audit Office of NSW tabled a report in parliament last Thursday that was critical of the Forestry Corporation of NSW (FCNSW in the report). The key complaints were:

- While FCNSW undertakes monitoring of its contractors, it does not do so consistently and does not target its monitoring activities on a risk basis.
- FCNSW has largely fulfilled mandatory Coastal IFOA training requirements, but has not yet trained other staff who would also benefit from the training.
- Contractor compliance appears to be improving, but there are gaps and inconsistencies in FCNSW's documentation of this.
- FCNSW is not measuring its overall compliance to determine how it is tracking against its target.

Recommendations included better staff training and improved consistency, targeting and measurement

of its reviews, activities and performance.

Forestry Corporation agreed there have been issues, releasing a statement that said "Forestry Corporation accepts the recommendations of the NSW Audit Office and is committed to making continued improvements to our operations where necessary.

"Our staff care passionately about the forests they work in and, over the last three years, we have significantly increased our efforts around compliance. This has included investment in technology solutions, putting more staff on the ground and a regular program of internal audits to supplement the external audits undertaken by our third-party certifier and the EPA as the regulator."

The reply went on to acknowledge that the report had shown an even-handed regard for the corporation,

saying, "It is pleasing that the report has identified a number of positives, including that Forestry Corporation has clearly articulated its compliance obligations in policies and procedures, communicates

these expectations to contractors, has provisions in its contracts and licences to require compliance and has overseen improvements in contractor compliance in recent years.

"There are always further opportunities for improvement and we will work through the recommendations from the Audit Office to action all opportunities available to further improve our processes."

Fast-growing hemp is being positioned as an alternative to timber in Gippsland

With the sudden halt of native timber forestry in Victoria, a surprising industry is looking to fill employment and supply gaps, but there are issues.

HEMP advocates hail the 'stigmatised' crop as the billion-dollar saviour of Victoria's ailing timber industry, but politicians are concerned the industry could pave the way to legalising cannabis.

Just six farmers are growing fewer than 200 hectares of hemp in Victoria, while Tasmania's \$4.5 million industry grows around six times that amount. That's a drop in the ocean when compared with the global industry, which is expected to grow from about \$7 billion a year to more than \$27 billion by 2027.

Victoria and Canada both passed legislation to allow industrial hemp cultivation and processing in 1998. While Canada has become a world leader in production, Australia remains far behind.

Now, Darren Christie, president of the non-profit industry organisation iHemp Victoria, has proposed that processors in Gippsland could replace timber with hemp. This would maintain employment and financial stability for logging communities while offering a solution to building supply shortages, he says.

"Industrial hemp is another chip and pulp industry, exactly the same as our timber industry," said Christie, who also chairs the Australian Hemp Building Institute.

Industrial hemp requires fewer agricultural inputs – fertiliser, pesticides and water – than many other crops, according to AgriFutures Australia, and has a wide variety of applications. But

the research body also says fibre transportation is costly due to hemp's light weight and large volume. This means the industry needs local growing and processing. And with home building companies going to the wall as building costs rise, locally produced construction materials could fill that gap.

Gippsland is perfectly placed to become an industrial hemp hub, say industry leaders.

"We can grow industrial hemp on a biomass scale in 100 days. Five thousand hectares — there's \$100 million into the Gippsland communities and farming," said Christie

The Victorian parliament last month agreed to an inquiry into opportunities to expand the hemp industry in Victoria. While supporting the motion, brought by Legalise Cannabis MP Rachel Payne, Liberal member Georgie Crozier said she had questions around the viability of the industry, as well as its potential outcomes. "I'm strongly supportive of medicinal cannabis, I don't

support legalising cannabis," she said.

Ms Payne says the fact that hemp and cannabis come from the same species can cause sticking points when it comes to state and federal regulation. "Hemp could be a real opportunity for the timber industry to pivot into," she says. "It can be used for a whole range of [things] from production of textiles through to bioplastics, construction and biofuel.

"We know that there's a lot of interest in not only the opportunities for what hemp can create, but also ... the fact that hemp is an incredible carbon sink."

Matthew Box runs Pro Hemp on the eastern outskirts of Melbourne, where he grows, processes and supplies hemp, and develops and builds hemp processing machinery. He says

the industry is on the verge of taking off in Victoria, but it needs support to scale up.

"There's so much demand for hemp, but it's always companies that want it in large volumes," Box said.

Innovative producers are coming out of the woodwork from all over the state, he said. Prefabricated building panels are being produced in central Victoria, bricks are being made in the west of the state, while hemp powder is being transformed into 3D printed houses in Victoria's south. But just six growers are managing about 200 hectares of hemp plantation in Victoria — about one sixth of Tasmania's production.

Industry leaders say draconian regulations and costly monitoring requirements must be overhauled.

Christie is calling on the state government to support and invest in the industry: "They've got to open their eyes and have a really deep, hard look – now – because otherwise we're 10 years behind."

Stockholm will be home to 'Wood City'

Developer Atrium Ljungberg has started work on what it plans to be the world's largest mass timber neighbourood.

SCANDINAVIAN studios Henning Larsen and White Arkitekter are designing Stockholm Wood City, which will become the world's largest mass-timber development and have the "serenity of a forest".

Set to be built in the Stockholm neighbourhood of Sickla, the project was dubbed the "world's largest wooden city" by developer Atrium Ljungberg as it will use more mass timber that any other project in development.

Stockholm Wood City, which will have 7000 office spaces, shops and amenities plus 2000 homes and cover 250,000m², is being designed by Danish studio Henning Larsen and Swedish firm White Arkitekter.

According to the developer, the district will feature natureinformed elements and was designed to have the feel of a forest.

"We sought to create an urban environment infused with the serenity of a forest, resulting in a dense, open space that bears the distinctively minimalistic and functional aesthetic of Scandinavian design," Atrium Ljungberg said.

"The architects innovatively

incorporated natural elements into the structures – for instance, green roofs for better insulation and large windows to let in natural light, embodying our vision of a city that thrives in harmony with nature."

The buildings will be constructed from fire-proofed mass timber.

As well as being made

from wood, a material that both sequesters carbon and emits fewer emissions than concrete, there are other benefits in building cities from wood, said the developer.

"Wooden construction means significantly reduced climate impact both during the construction phase and through the whole life cycle," Atrium Ljungberg said. can then apply in the following phases," the developer said.

"Our core strategy is to develop large, interconnected areas. In this way, we can create places full of variety that people enjoy and where they want to be, as opposed to just setting up a single building."




